Jamie Zepp, the author of **Beyond the earth and the sky** shared about her book. She also spoke about her stay in Bhutan and how much Bhutan had changed since then. Hundreds join in saving lives



More than hundred students donated blood on 9th September 2015 in Royal Thimphu College. It was organized by a team from Jigme Dorji Wangchuck National Referral Hospital with the help of Student Service Department and the Student Government.

The report says that, more than 290 students registered to give their blood. However, few numbers of donors were rejected as they did not read the normal blood pressure as required and some of them being under medications. It was the 11th blood donation camp which the college organizes every semester with the help of the Health workers from JDWNRH. The donation campaign started at 9:00 Am in morning till 5 Pm. More than 10 health workers were engaged in a day program assisted by the Student Leaders. Students were reminded to donate blood without any disturbance to their regular classes. One of the health worker said, "giving blood is not only to save others life but also maintaining one's health too"

The donors were given milk, juice, cake, egg and momo as refreshments. Sangay Dorji, a third year student says "after donating blood, I feel very light and comfortable. Moreover I am happy to give blood to save someone's life". Majority of the student donate blood to save lives while some registered to check their physical overall wellbeing and fitness purposes.

RTC lecturer visits Nepal

RTC Faculty, Mr. Jesse Montes, Lecturer on Environmental studies visited Nepal for a five day long conference on eco-tourism from 5th October to 10th October.

The conference was divided into two parts.

First they discussed their idea, signed the contract with Himalayan University Consortium under International centre for Integral Mountain Development and received the grant worth USD 20,000 for the research. The member countries were China, Afghanistan, Pakistan, India, Bangladesh, Bhutan and Nepal.

In the second part, the meetings with the partners were conducted as the Royal Thimphu College plans to partner and collaborate with Kathmandu and Sikkim University. The research began in the fall of 2015. There are ten students working with the faculties. These ten students were selected after they applied to be a part of the research work. This research work will be carried for one and a half year. "The students are about 90% trained and almost ready to go to fields" says Mr. Montes. The students will have their first field trip from November 10th till 15th. The students are trained to questions, Pilot interview, background literature review and GPS. Maiti Maya Subba, one of the ten students says, "We are doing many reading, such as articles. We are also being trained in GPS. I think the work is going to a little hard as beginners but will be fun".

This result will be further compared with the results of Kathmandu and Sikkim University.

The research is looking at the sustainability of tourism. It will look into ecotourism and determining how successful they are in determining the economy of Bhutan, social and environmental objectives. "The meeting was successful despite the strike in Nepal", said Mr. Montes.
