The Last Song by Nicholas Sparks


It's a heart-warming novel, which is written sumptuously based on trust, love and commitment. It is about a girl who is stubborn and lost, who later develops camaraderie.



Easy Money by Jens Lapidus

"Easy money" is a thriller about organized crime in Stockholm's underworld. The author, Jens Lapidus, is a successful Swedish criminal lawyer with a clientele consisting of precisely those individuals he is writing about in this novel.

The central characters are three men with different backgrounds but with one thing in common – they want to make "easy money" fast. They cross paths in their search for "easy money".

JW, a Swedish guy from a working class home in northern Sweden who lives a double life in Stockholm. He makes friends with upper class brats. They party wild with girls, alcohol and drugs in Stockholm's hottest night clubs. JW studies at the university and drives taxi illegally at night to finance his lifestyle until he gets recruited by a drug dealer and start making lots of money.


Jorge, a Latino, who knows everything about cocaine, escapes from prison and then prepares to revenge those who snitched on him, the "Yugo mafia".

Mrado, a Serb, assassin, debt collector, human murder machine, and member of the "Yugo mafia". When he gets demoted he teams up with another member of the "Yugo mafia" and together they start planning to create their own drug imperium. There is also a softer side to Mrado. He has a daughter and wants to be a good father to her but at the same time he can't give up his violent, criminal life.

The book is raw and dark. It gives a picture of a brutal reality with drugs, money laundering, killings, various criminal organizations at war with each other, etc.

And we learn that there's no such thing as "easy money". There's always a price to pay.

KAZUO ISHIGURO WINS THE NOBEL PRIZE IN LITERATURE 2017



"The 2017 Nobel Prize in Literature has been awarded to British writer Kazuo Ishiguro, whose best-known novels include 'The Remains of the Day' and 'Never Let Me Go.'

Sara Danius, permanent secretary of the Swedish Academy, said Ishiguro is a writer 'who, in novels of great emotional force, has uncovered the abyss beneath our illusory sense of connection with the world.'

Ishiguro, whose family moved to Britain from Japan when he was 5 years old, has written eight books, the most recent of which, "The Buried Giant," was published in 2015."



A Man Called Ove

"Ove is almost certainly the grumpiest man you will ever meet. He thinks himself surrounded by idiots. He has staunch principles, strict routines, and a short fuse, but behind his cranky exterior there is a story and a sadness. A chatty young couple with two daughters moves in next door and accidentally flatten Ove's mailbox. From there, a relationship begins to form." (Source: RTC library catalog and book back cover)

It's a feel-good story with both tears and laughter. It is a book that uses dark humor to remind us that there's light at the end of the tunnel.

"Ove unhooks his jacket and goes outside for his daily inspection. With equal surprise and dissatisfaction, he sees the cat sitting in the snow outside his door. It seems to have been sitting there all night. Ove slams the front door extra hard to scare it away. Apparently it doesn't have the common sense to take fright. Instead it sits there in the snow, licking his stomach. Utterly unconcerned. Ove doesn't like that sort of behavior....Ove waives his arms at it. The cat doesn't budge an inch. 'This is private land!' says Ove."

The book was made into a movie 2015. The movie is available on the MSS in Swedish with English subtitles. The movie was nominated for Foreign Language Film for Oscars 2017.

In September it was announced that Tom Hanks will star (and produce) an English language adaptation of "A man called Ove".

I can recommend both the book and the movie. The movie stays true to the book, I think.




